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the new translation of the classic work by the author of wretched of the earth a strange haunting mélange of analysis and revolutionary manifesto newsweek few modern voices have had as profound an impact on the black identity and critical race theory as frantz fanon and black skin white masks represents some of his most important work this new translation by richard philcox makes fanon s masterwork accessible to a new generation of readers it also includes a foreword by philosopher kwame anthony appiah a major influence on civil rights anti colonial and black consciousness movements around the world black skin white masks is the unsurpassed study of the black psyche in a white world hailed for its scientific analysis and poetic grace when it was first published in 1952 the book remains a vital force today from one of the most important theorists of revolutionary struggle colonialism and racial difference in history

first published in 1952 frantz fanon s black skin white masks is one of the most important anti colonial works of the post war period it is both a profound critique of the conscious and unconcious ways in which colonialism brutalises the

colonised and a passionate cry from deep within a black body alienated by the colonial system and in search of liberation from it this volume is the first collection of essays specifically devoted to fanon's text it offers a wide range of interpretations of the text by leading scholars in a number of disciplines chapters deal with fanon's martinican heritage fanon and creolism ideas of race and racism and new humanism fanon and sartre representations of blacks and jews and the psychoanalysis of race gender and violence contributors offer new ways of reading the text and the volume as a whole constitutes an important contribution to the growing field of fanon studies

frantz fanon's explosive black skin white masks is a merciless exposé of the psychological damage done by colonial rule across the world using fanon's incisive analytical abilities to expose the consequences of colonialism on the psyches of colonized peoples it is both a crucial text in post colonial theory and a lesson in the power of analytical skills to reveal the realities that hide beneath the surface of things fanon was himself part of a colonized nation martinique and grew up with the values and beliefs of french culture imposed upon him while remaining relegated to an inferior status in society qualifying as a psychiatrist in france before working in algeria a french colony subject to brutal repression his own experiences granted him a sharp insight into the psychological problems associated with colonial rule like any good analytical thinker fanon's particular skill was in breaking things down and joining dots his analysis of colonial rule exposed its implicit assumptions and how they were replicated in colonised populations allowing fanon to unpick the hidden reasons behind his own conflicted psychological make up and those of his patients unflinchingly clear sighted in doing so black skin white masks remains a shocking read today

the essays cover an astonishing range of subject matter from mental health and plastic surgery to literature music political philosophy performance popular culture and history they interrogate the dominance of whiteness exposing the underpinnings of white privilege and considering its global consequences

this timely collection asks the reader to consider how society's modern notion of humans as rational isolated individuals has contributed to psychological and social problems and oppressive power structures experts from a range of disciplines offer a complex understanding of how humans are shaped by history tradition and institutions drawing upon the work of lacan fanon and foucault this text examines cultural memory modern ideas of race and gender the roles of symbolism and mythology and neoliberalism's impact on psychology through clinical vignettes and suggested applications it demonstrates significant alternatives to the isolated individualism of western philosophy and psychology this interdisciplinary volume is essential reading for clinicians and anyone looking to augment their understanding of how human beings are shaped by the societies they inhabit

this edited volume draws upon lacanian psychoanalytic theory to examine the conscious and unconscious forces underlying race as a social formation conceptualizing race racial identity and racism in ways that go beyond traditional modes of psychoanalytic thought featuring contributions by lacanian scholars from diverse geographical and disciplinary contexts

chapters span a wide breadth of topics including white nationalism and contemporary debates over confederate monuments emergent theories of race rooted in afropessimism and postcolonialism analyses of racism in apartheid and american slavery clinical reflections on latinx and other racialized patients and applications of lacan's concepts of the lamella drive and sexualization to processes of racialization the collection both reorients readers' understandings of race through its deployment of lacanian theory and redefines the lacanian subject through its theorizing of subjectivity in relation to race racism and racial identification lacan and race will be a definitive text for psychoanalytic theorists and contemporary scholars of race appealing to readers across the fields of psychology cultural studies humanities politics and sociology

from 1940 to 1945 forty thousand patients died in french psychiatric hospitals the vichy regime's soft extermination let patients die of cold starvation or lack of care but in saint alban sur limagnole a small village in central france one psychiatric hospital attempted to resist hoarding food with the help of the local population the staff not only worked to keep patients alive but began to rethink the practical and theoretical bases of psychiatric care the movement that began at saint alban came to be known as institutional psychotherapy and would go on to have a profound influence on postwar french thought in disalienation camille robcis grapples with the historical intellectual and psychiatric meaning of the ethics articulated at saint alban by exploring the movement's key thinkers including françois tosquelles frantz fanon félix guattari and michel foucault anchored in the history of one hospital robcis's study draws on a wide geographic context revolutionary spain occupied france colonial algeria and beyond and charts the movement's place within a broad political economic landscape from fascism to stalinism to postwar capitalism

this volume collects over two dozen of stuart hall's essays lectures reviews catalog texts and conversations on art film and photography providing rare insights into his engagement with the intellectual and aesthetic space of the visual imaginary

beyond man reimagines the meaning and potential of a philosophy of religion that better attends to the inextricable links among religion racism and colonialism an yountae eleanor craig and the contributors reckon with the colonial and racial implications of the field's history by staging a conversation with black indigenous and decolonial studies in their introduction an and craig point out that european descended christianity has historically defined itself by its relation to the other while paradoxically claiming to represent and speak to humanity in its totality the topics include secularism the eucharist's relation to blackness and sixteenth century brazilian cannibalism rituals as well as an analysis of how mircea eliade's conception of the sacred underwrites settler colonial projects and imaginaries throughout the contributors also highlight the theorizing of afro caribbean thinkers such as sylvia wynter c l r james frantz fanon and aimé césaire whose work disrupts the normative western categories of religion and philosophy contributors an yountae ellen armour j kameron carter eleanor craig amy hollywood vincent lloyd filipe maia mayra rivera devin singh joseph r winters

frantz fanon may be most known for his more obviously political writings but in the first instance he was a clinician a

black caribbean psychiatrist who had the improbable task of treating disturbed and traumatized north african patients during the wars of decolonization investigating and foregrounding the clinical system that fanon devised in an attempt to intervene against negrophobia and anti blackness this book rereads his clinical and political work together arguing that the two are mutually imbricated for the first time fanon s therapeutic innovations are considered along with his more overtly political and cultural writings to ask how the crises of war affected his practice informed his politics and shaped his subsequent ideas as david marriott suggests this combination of the clinical and political involves a psychopolitics that is by definition complex difficult and perpetually challenging he details this psychopolitics from two points of view focusing first on fanon s sociotherapy its diagnostic methods and concepts and second on fanon s cultural theory more generally in our present climate of fear and terror over black presence and the violence to which it gives rise whither fanon reminds us of fanon s scandalous actuality and of the continued urgency of his message
